

## Changes to the Communicable Disease and Injury Reporting Rules

The new Communicable Disease and Injury Reporting rules went into effect on September 12, 2014 ([http://www.ok.gov/health/Disease,\\_Prevention,\\_Preparedness/Acute\\_Disease\\_Service/Disease\\_Reporting/What\\_to\\_Report/index.html](http://www.ok.gov/health/Disease,_Prevention,_Preparedness/Acute_Disease_Service/Disease_Reporting/What_to_Report/index.html)). The significant changes to the rules are listed below.

### **Diseases to be Reported Immediately upon Suspicion, Diagnosis or Positive Test**

Diseases/conditions that have been added

- Novel coronavirus
- Novel influenza A

### **Diseases and Conditions to be Reported within One Business Day**

Diseases/conditions that have been modified

- Hepatitis C in persons  $\leq 40$  years or in persons having jaundice or ALT  $> \text{ or } = 400$  regardless of age with laboratory confirmation. If hepatitis C EIA is confirmed by NAT for HCV RNA, or signal-to-cut-off (s/co) ratio or index is predictive of a true positive then report results of the entire hepatitis panel (*Removed RIBA as a reportable confirmatory test for hepatitis C*)
- Influenza associated hospitalization or death (*Influenza associated pediatric mortality was expanded to include all influenza associated hospitalizations or deaths*)

### **Diseases and Conditions to be Reported within One Month**

Diseases/conditions that have been modified

- CD4 cell count with corresponding CD4 cell count percentage of total (by laboratories only) (*Expanded reporting of CD4 cell counts from  $<500$  to all*)
