

NON-HISPANIC AMERICAN INDIAN Adair County residents had the **highest** rate of death.

- Males were **3.4 times more likely** to die than females.
- Drug overdose **death rates increased 8%** from 22.3 per 100,000 (2012-2016) to 24.1 per 100,000 (2017-2021).
- More than three out of four (77%) people who died had a history of substance use.

Adair County had the 35th highest nonfatal drug overdose hospitalization rate in the state.

- **56**% of hospitalizations were unintentional and **31**% due to self harm.
- Females were **29% more likely** to be hospitalized than males.
- Drug overdose **hospitalization rates decreased 36%** from 135 per 100,000 (2016-2018) to 86.5 per 100,000 (2019-2021).
- Non-Hispanic White Adair County residents had the **highest rate** of hospitalizations.
