

Garfield County residents had the **highest** rate of death.

- Males were **3.7 times more likely** to die than females.
- Drug overdose **death rates increased 33**% from 9.3 per 100,000 (2012-2016) to 12.4 per 100,000 (2017-2021).
- More than two out of three (68%) people who died had a history of substance use.

hospitalized for a nonfatal drug overdose from 2019-2021.

- **34**% of hospitalizations were unintentional and **64**% due to self harm.
- Females were **39% more likely** to be hospitalized than males.
- Drug overdose **hospitalization rates decreased 9%** from 140.1 per 100,000 (2016-2018) to 127.6 per 100,000 (2019-2021).
- Non-Hispanic Black Garfield County residents had the **highest rate** of hospitalizations.

The most common substances involved in hospitalizations were:

- **▶** Antidepressants
- ▶ Opioids
- ► Non-opioid pain medications
- **▶** Benzodiazepines
- ▶ Antipsychotics
