

The Edmond Area Chamber of Commerce supports the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT)'s request for FY24 Railroad Crossing Elimination (RCE) Program funding to support the Prioritizing Crossings to Save Lives in Central Oklahoma Project (Project).

This critical planning project will complete a comprehensive master planning effort evaluating 52 at-grade crossings within the urban areas serviced by the Regional Transportation Authority of Central Oklahoma (RTA). The RTA, in partnership with BNSF and the cities of Edmond, Oklahoma City, and Norman, seeks to use 37 miles of the existing BNSF freight network through Oklahoma City for the proposed North/South commuter rail service.
