On behalf of the Tulsa Community Foundation (TCF), I want to offer my strongest support to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation's decision to pursue the Reconnecting Communities Pilot (RCP) discretionary grant funding.

Organized in 1998, TCF is one of the largest community foundations in the United States with over fifteen hundred donor advised funds and nearly four billion dollars in assets. Our mission is simple: to benefit the Tulsa Metropolitan Area and Eastern Oklahoma in charitable causes. We see in our work and in our day-to-day lives the profound effect of segregation and inequality in our city, exacerbated to this day by the 1921 Tulsa Race Massacre. As a result, we are committed to policies and practices to combat those inequities. In fact, TCF has had a hand in incubating, creating and/or supporting many Greenwood-based organizations that will be key stakeholders in the Reconnecting Communities planning process and are already doing great work to re-build the once thriving district like Greenwood Rising, Terrence Crutcher Foundation, John Hope Franklin Center for Reconciliation, among others.
