What Is Paternity Acknowledgment?

- Child Born Out of Wedlock
- Parents Officially List Father
- Acknowledgment of Paternity (AOP) Form Completed
- Allows Father Name on Birth Certificate

Legal Authority

- 63 O.S. § 1-311.3(A)
 - "...[T]he person required by Section 1-311...to prepare and file and birth certificate shall:
 - (1) Provide written materials and an oral, audio, or video presentation to the child's mother and/or natural father, including an Acknowledgment of Paternity on a form prescribed by the Department of Human Services."

Legal Authority, continued

- 63 O.S. § 1-311(A)(2)
 - "Provide written information, furnished by the Department of Human Services, along with an oral, audio, or video presentation, to the mother and acknowledging father:
 - (a) explaining that the completed AOP shall be filed with the State Department of Health, Division of Vital Records.
 - (b) regarding the benefits of having her child's paternity established and the availability of paternity establishment services...,
 - (c) explaining the implications of signing, including parental rights and responsibilities, and
 - (d) explaining the time limitations to rescind and/or challenge the AOP..."

Why Is Paternity Important?

- Provides Sense of Identity for Child
- Sets Stage for Access to Medical History and Ancestry
- Proof of Legal Relationship
 - Inheritance
 - Veteran's Benefits
 - Insurance
- Acknowledgment Does Not Require Later Court Order

When Should AOP Be Used?

- Parents Not Married to Each Other
- Baby Conceived by Intercourse
 Between Mother and Man Claiming to
 Be Father
- Can Sometimes Be Used When Presumed Father Exists

Presumed Father?

- Mother Married to Someone Other Than
 Father: Husband = Presumed Father
- Baby Born Within 300 Days of Divorce:
 Husband = Presumed Father
- Man Married Mother and Asserted Paternity
 - Assertion Filed with Health Department
 - Voluntarily Named on Child's Birth Certificate
 - He Promised on Record to Support Child

Is AOP Legal?

- Acknowledgment of Paternity Creates Legal Finding of Paternity by Law
 - Oklahoma Statutes, Title 10, Section 7700-306
 - No Fee for Filing if Done at Hospital
 - Creates Parent Child Legal Relationship
 - Imposes Legal Duty to Support Child
 - Enables Court to Address Visitation & Custody

- Place of Birth
- Local Child Support Office
- Local Health Departments
- Division of Vital Records
- www.OKDHS.org
 - **Must Complete Questionnaire**
 - Questionnaire Responses Make Form Available

Names on Birth Certificates

- Legal Father's Name on Birth
 Certificate
 - Husband
 - Acknowledged Father
- No Legal Father = No Father's
 Name on Birth Certificate

Legal Requirements

- Parents Must Receive Notice of Rights & Responsibilities
- Father's Name Can Be Added to Birth Certificate
- Can Establish Paternity by Completing Acknowledgment of Paternity form
- Do Not Sign AOP if Not Sure
- May Rescind Within 60 Days
- May Open Case with CSED & Have Genetic Testing Prior to AOP

Rescission of Paternity

- Either Parent May Rescind Within 60 Days
 - For Any Reason
 - Does Not Require Other Parent to Agree
- Rescission of Acknowledgment of Paternity Form Completed and Sent to Division of Vital Records
- Parents Under 18 May Rescind Within 60 Days of Turning 18

Critical Requirements

- Parents Must Understand AOP Before Signing
- Receive Oral Information
 - **1-800-522-2922**
 - Read Back of AOP to Parents
 - Watch Voluntary Acknowledgment of Paternity Video
- Receive Written Information
- Completed, Witnessed Form Sent to Division of Vital Records
- Parents Must Receive Their Copies of AOP Form

What if > 60 Days Goes By?

- Rescission Time Is Over
- AOP Can Only Be Challenged in Court
 - Fraud
 - Duress
 - Material Mistake of Fact
- Court Challenge Must Be Within 2
 Years

What if Mother Is Married?

- She and Biological Father Can Still
 Complete AOP if Child < 2 Years Old
- Denial of Paternity Form Completed by Husband Must Accompany AOP
- Denial Can Only Be Used When AOP Is Being Completed

Denying Paternity

- Completely Terminates a Presumed Father's Parental Rights
 - Visitation
 - Duty to Support Child
- Allows Biological Father to Become Legal Father
- Can Be Rescinded Within 60 Days Using Rescission of Denial of Paternity Form

AOP Form Section

- Legal Declaration
- Facility CodeNumber
- Child'sInformation
- Mother's Information

- Father'sInformation
- EmploymentInformation
- Private Insurance Information
- Legal Statements

Signatures

- Signatures of Parents Must Match the Names of the Mother & Father Listed on Form
- Parents Cannot Witness Each Other's
 Signatures
- Witnesses Cannot Be Related to Mother or Father

Minor Parents

- Minor Parents Can Sign the Acknowledgment of Paternity
 Form
- Rescission Time Period Ends 60
 Days After Parent Turns 18

Undocumented Individuals

- Undocumented Individuals May
 Sign the Acknowledgment of
 Paternity
- SSN Field Required on Form If No SSN Enter "Unknown" "None" or "N/A"

Married Parents

- Parents Married to Each Other Do Not Sign the Acknowledgment of Paternity
- Husband's Name Is Listed on Birth Certificate
- If Husband Not Father, Husband May Complete Denial of Paternity Form and Father & Mother Complete Acknowledgment of Paternity Form

Unmarried Parents

- Information About Acknowledgment of Paternity Is Presented to Parents
- Acknowledgment of Paternity Form May Be Completed by Parents
- Allows Father's Name to Be Listed on Birth Certificate

What If Parents Don't Sign AOP

- Parents Are Not Required to Sign AOP
- If One or Both Is Unsure About Signing Do Not Allow Them to Sign
- Parent(s) Can Open Case with CSE and Request Genetic Testing
- Both Parents Must Sign AOP for It to Be Completed
 - Can Sign Different Forms Referenced to Each Other
 - Parent(s) Cannot Be Deceased

Time Limits

- Married Mother Child Must Be
 2 or AOP Cannot Be Completed
- If Child > 18 Adult Child Consent Form Must Also Be Completed
