







SoonerCare contracting successful

More than 95 percent of **SoonerCare** primary care providers opted to continue their contracts with the Oklahoma Health Care Authority during the recent 2005 contract renewal period.

In addition, 17 new providers from across the state were added to the program. With the completion of the contracting period, capacity in the SoonerCare program increased nine percent as compared with September 2004.

"This is an excellent accomplishment for the **SoonerCare** staff," said Becky Pasternik-Ikard, Director of **SoonerCare** and Care Management Services. "It speaks very well of the relationship our Provider Representatives have developed with the provider community."

Providers with the **SoonerCare** program gave input that was used in preparing the 2005 agreement. Major revisions were incorporated in the capitated benefit package, Pasternik-Ikard noted.

Of the small number of providers who did leave the program, none left due to dissatisfaction with the program, according to Melinda Jones, director of **SoonerCare** Compliance and Program Development, "One provider from a bordering state, who had a very small panel, terminated her contract because she wasn't busy enough with **SoonerCare** members. Other terminations were the result of deaths, moves or business changes," she said.

In the Indian Health Services, Tribal and urban Indian health clinics' Primary Care Case Management (PCCM) program, all existing contractors continued for 2005. In addition, two new contracts were executed.

SoonerCare is Oklahoma's PCCM program in which the OHCA contracts directly with primary care providers throughout the state to provide basic health care services to more than 360,000 Medicaid recipients.
