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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The State of Oklahoma collected over \$238 million in tribal gaming exclusivity fees in fiscal year 2026 under state-tribal gaming compacts. This is a 7.8% increase over the previous year.

Tribes paid the FY 2026 exclusivity fees based on over \$3.93 billion in revenue generated from Class III electronic games¹ and nonhouse-banked card games.

Since 2005, when tribes first began operating under voter-approved, state-tribal compacts, exclusivity payments have grown year-over-year with only two exceptions in FY 2014 and FY 2020.

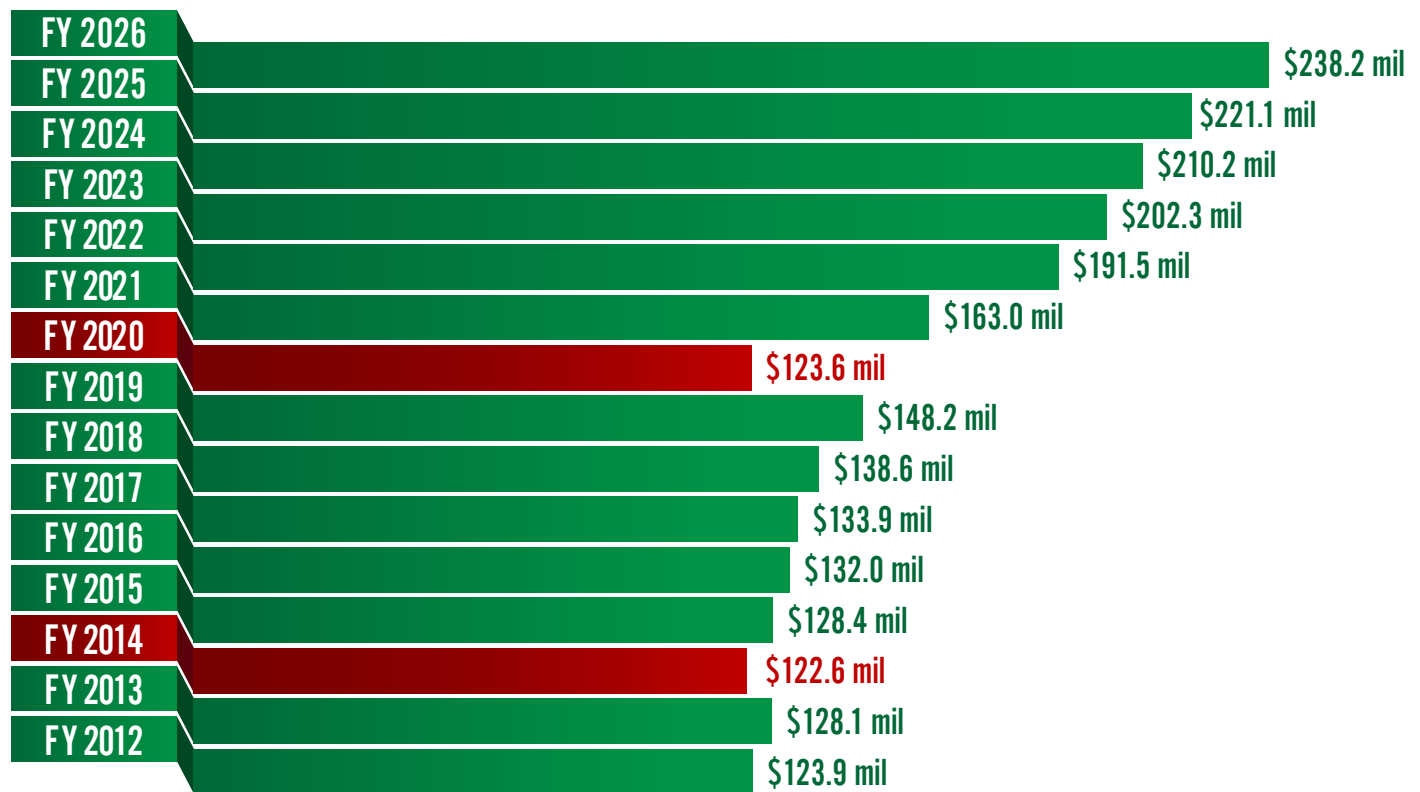
Under the compacts, tribes pay monthly exclusivity fees based on a sliding scale for Class III electronic games. Exclusivity fees are distributed to the Education Reform Revolving Fund (1017 Fund), the General Revenue Fund and the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services. In FY 2026, the 1017 Fund received \$209.4 million and the GRF received \$28.6 million. ODMHSAS statutorily receives a set \$250,000 annually from the exclusivity fees.

The compact also includes minimum state regulatory requirements on games, accounting and auditing standards, the licensing of employees, liability insurance, property claim procedures and several other provisions. The Gaming Compliance Unit of the Office of Management and Enterprise Services carries out the oversight responsibilities granted to the state under the compact.

¹ The state-tribal gaming compact allows for the play of the following electronic games: bonanza-style bingo, instant bingo and amusement games.

TOTAL EXCLUSIVITY FEES

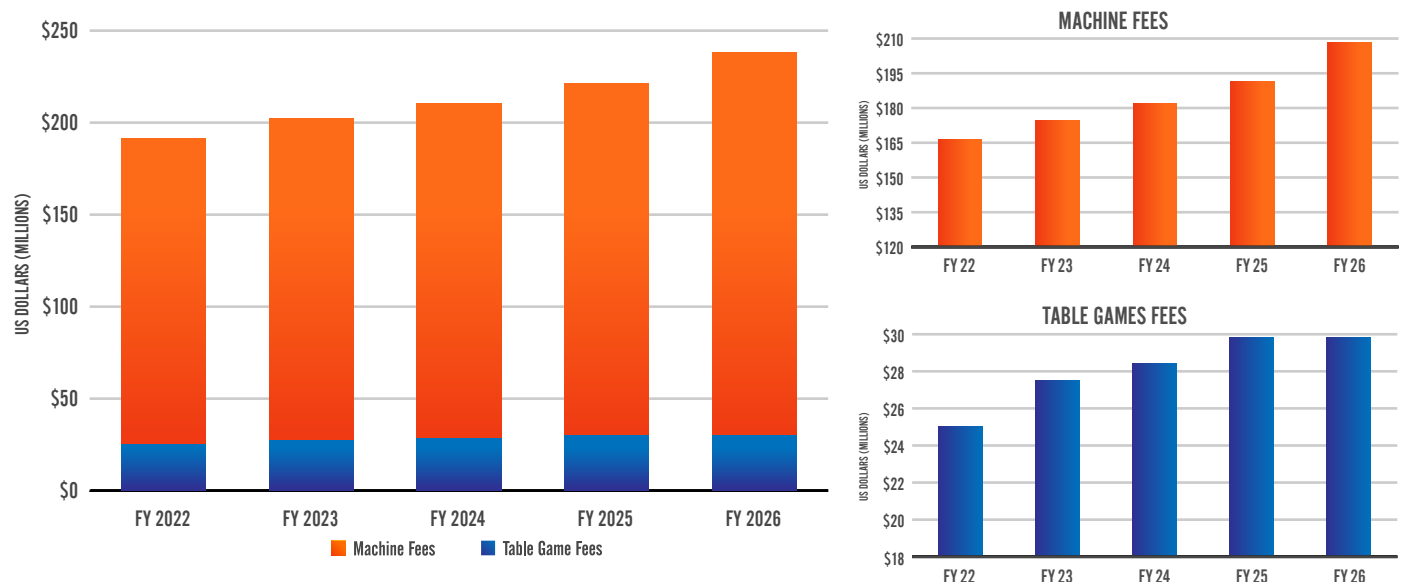
Exclusivity fee collections of **\$238,240,091.31** came in at approximately 7.8% above FY 2025.



ELECTRONIC AND TABLE GAME FEES

The payment from electronic games is typically much greater than the payment received from table games, and FY 2026 was no different.

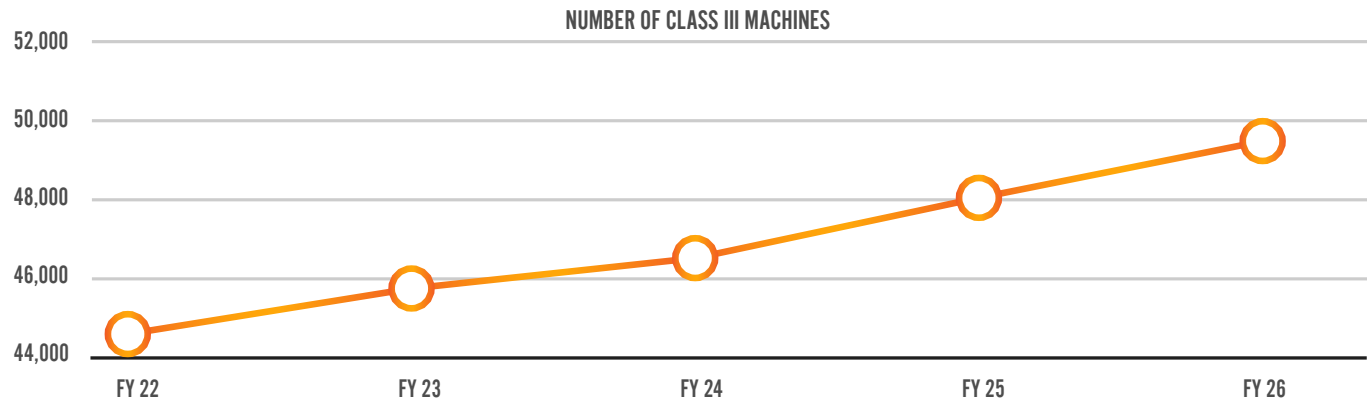
In FY 2026, tribes paid \$208,433,927.15 in electronic gaming fees, a \$17,193,339.71, or 9%, increase from the previous year. FY 2026 table games fees totaled \$29,806,164.16, a \$36,460.59, or 0.12%, decrease from FY 2025.



CLASS III MACHINES

The number of Class III machines rose slightly in FY 2026.

In FY 2026, there was a monthly average of 49,485 Class III machines compared to 48,049 in FY 2025.



The growth of Class III machines was strong from 2005 to 2008, but weakened after the National Indian Gaming Commission withdrew restrictive Class II regulations in 2008. Class II machines declined from 2005 to 2008 but have grown substantially since 2009. The number of Class III machines has begun to increase again, and figures available indicate Class II machines continue to grow at a faster pace as a percentage of total machines. The state collects exclusivity fees from Class III machines and nonhouse-banked card games but not Class II games.

STATE AND TRIBAL PORTIONS OF REVENUE

In FY 2026, tribal revenue from Class III games and table games was \$3,934,874,398.49, of which tribes paid \$238,240,091.31 to the state.

Under the state-tribal compact, tribes pay monthly exclusivity fees from Class III game revenues based on a sliding scale. For the first \$10 million in revenue, tribes pay 4% to the state; for the next \$10 million, the payment is 5%; and for revenues more than \$20 million, the payment is 6%. Tribes pay 10% of the monthly net win from table games.



WHERE DOES THE STATE MONEY GO?

As required by statute, the exclusivity fees go to the Education Reform Revolving Fund (1017 Fund), the General Revenue Fund and the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services. ODMHSAS receives \$250,000 annually. Of the remaining fees, the 1017 Fund receives 88% and the GRF receives 12%. The 1017 Fund received \$209,431,280.39 in FY 2026 compared to \$194,333,226.76 in FY 2025. The GRF received \$28,558,810.96 in FY 2026 compared to \$26,499,985.47 in FY 2025.
